Capabilities required for a changing world


As you know, one focal point for Chevalier into the near future is to develop, source, establish and develop new electives, contemporary assessments, and new credentials to measure student performance, engagement and success which lead the development of a trusted and warranted Chevalier Learner Profile relevant to our rapidly changing world.

The recent release of the World Economic Forum 2023 Jobs Report offers insights into the changing world of work. When looking at its key findings, I feel all schools are compelled to consider the role education needs to take in preparing students for this new world of work. Key findings include:

- Technology adoption will remain a key driver of business transformation in the next five years.
- Within technology adoption, big data, cloud computing, and AI feature highly on likelihood of adoption.
- (Pleasingly) the impact of most technologies on jobs is expected to be a net positive over the next five years.



- Large-scale job growth is expected in education, agriculture, and digital commerce and trade.
- The largest losses are expected in administrative roles and in traditional security, factory, and commerce roles.
- Analytical thinking and creative thinking remain the most important skills for workers in 2023. Other important skills required are:



Please note, the above does not call for an ATAR number, nor a certain level of band results in the New South Wales HSC; although, I would say in the context of skills required, many of them are a focus of work throughout secondary schooling. What is missing are the visualisations, dashboards and profiles which reflect a child's growth and development in these areas. This will be key piece of our work over the next few years. For the sake of our students, your children, it is a must!

Sleep Ninja App (Black Dog Institute)

During last week's school assembly our Student Care Captains, Lily Campbell and George Myers launched the Sleep Ninja App to the student body.

This week in Home Room students were encouraged to download the app and commence a 6 week program in order to enhance their knowledge of the importance of sleep routines, become aware of their habits contributing to poor sleep routines and learn key strategies to change unhelpful sleep patterns.

What is the Sleep Ninja App?

Sleep Ninja is a free, evidence-based smartphone app shown to be effective in helping young people with sleep problems. Over 6 weeks, Sleep Ninja teaches skills based on cognitive behavioural therapy for insomnia which promote sleep quality and



healthy sleep habits and reduce signs of depression. Sleep Ninja has been developed in collaboration with young people, their parents and carers, psychologists, counsellors, and sleep experts.

What does it involve?

The program involves students completing one training session and tracking their sleep for 3 nights (out of a 7-night period). They will take approximately 6 weeks to complete the Sleep Ninja program (6 training sessions/modules).

In a typical week, the student:

- completes a training session (it takes about 5-10min to complete)
- puts into practice what they are learning
- unlocks the next level by tracking their sleep for a minimum of 3 nights to encourage a healthy sleep routine
- uses the optional functions e.g., relaxation audio and reminder to wind down.

It would be great to see as many of our students engage with this app in order to:

- educate them about the importance of sleep,
- become aware of their habits contributing to poor sleep, and
- learn both behavioural and cognitive strategies to change their unhelpful sleep patterns.

Features of the app include:

- a sleep tracking function
- recommended bedtimes based on sleep guidelines
- reminders to start a wind down routine each night
- clinician-guided relaxation audio to help prepare the mind and body for sleep
- a series of sleep tips and general information about sleep.

We would encourage all parents and carers to have a conversation with their young person about the positivity of engaging with this app.

Adult Reader/Writer volunteers for formal exams

New Permission Notes

The College has partnered with EdSmart to roll out electronic permission notes for student excursions. EdSmart is a cloud-based software product that enables us to handle communications with parents and carers electronically. Initially, we will be using it to send and receive permission notes without the need for paper.
